OJJDP FY 2022 Strengthening ICAC Technological Investigative Capacity

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Overview

The [U.S. Department of Justice](#) (DOJ), [Office of Justice Programs](#) (OJP), [Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention](#) (OJJDP) seeks applications for funding to increase the technological investigative capacity and associated training of Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force personnel nationwide through the development, refinement, and advancement of widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies that address child pornography (herein referred to as child sexual abuse material - CSAM), exploitation, and sex trafficking. This program furthers the DOJ's mission by supporting the efforts of law enforcement and prosecutors to combat crimes against children.

This solicitation incorporates the [OJP Grant Application Resource Guide](#) by reference. The OJP Grant Application Resource Guide provides guidance to applicants on how to prepare and submit applications for funding to OJP. **If this solicitation expressly modifies any provision in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in this solicitation as to that provision.**

For purposes of this solicitation, “state” means any state of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

To advance Executive Order 13929 Safe Policing for Safe Communities, the Attorney General determined that all state, local, and university or college law enforcement agencies must be certified by an approved independent credentialing body or have started the certification process, to be eligible for FY 2022 DOJ discretionary grant funding. To become certified, the law enforcement agency must meet two mandatory conditions: (1) the agency’s use-of-force policies adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws and (2) the agency’s use-of-force policies prohibit chokeholds except in situations where use of deadly force is allowed by law. The certification requirement also applies to law enforcement agencies receiving DOJ discretionary grant funding through a subaward. Submission Information

Applications will be submitted to DOJ in two steps:

Step 1: The applicant must submit, by the Grants.gov deadline, the required Application for Federal Assistance standard form (SF)-424 and the Disclosure of Lobbying Activities (SF-LLL) form when they register in Grants.gov at <https://www.grants.gov/web/grants/register.html>. To register in Grants.gov, applicants will need to obtain a Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) and System for Award Management (SAM) registration or renewal.

Beginning April 4, 2022, the Federal Government will cease using the Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number to uniquely identify entities. At that point, entities doing business with the Federal Government will use a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) created in SAM.gov. If your entity is currently registered in SAM.gov, your UEI has already been assigned and is viewable in SAM.gov. This includes inactive registrations. 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Program Description

Overview

OJP is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community. This solicitation provides funding for applicant organizations to increase the technological investigative capacity of Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task forces and their affiliates as well as related state, tribal, and local law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies through training and the development and/or enhancement of widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies that address child sexual abuse material (CSAM) and online child exploitation.

Statutory Authority

Department of Justice Appropriations Act, 2019 (Public Law 116-6)

Specific Information

OJJDP has supported the ICAC Task Force Program since 1998. The ICAC Task Force Program supports a national network of 61 multiagency, multijurisdictional task forces engaged in investigations, forensic examinations, and prosecutions related to technology-facilitated child sexual exploitation. Additionally, the task forces provide forensic and investigative technical assistance to law enforcement and prosecutorial officials. The ICAC Task Force Program also provides community education information to parents, educators, prosecutors, law enforcement, and others concerned with understanding the technological challenges of investigating and prosecuting child sexual exploitation matters.

There are three categories of funding under this solicitation:

Category 1: Investigative Tool and Technology Development – Develop new and innovative widely used investigative tools, methods and technologies for law enforcement, prosecutors, and other professionals that address child sexual abuse material, child sexual exploitation, and child sex trafficking nationwide.

The development of these tools will help the law enforcement community and prosecutorial agencies nationwide to overcome current technology-related investigative challenges. Examples of such tools include, but are not limited to, those that efficiently and effectively parse through digital evidence; expedite evidence collection and the transfer of digital files; facilitate decryption; address mobile chat encryptions; automate data intelligence; and support ICAC case management, case deconfliction, and high-priority suspect identification. In addition, this category will support the development of tools that assist the law enforcement community nationwide in overcoming challenges in covert operations; provide national reporting and information-sharing capabilities among federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement (particularly ICAC task forces); and support peer-to-peer investigations.

Category 2: Investigative Tool and Technology Enhancement – Enhance and/or refine existing widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies for law enforcement, prosecutors, and other professionals that address child sexual abuse material, child sexual exploitation, and child sex trafficking nationwide.

Improvements to these widely used tools will help the law enforcement community and prosecutorial agencies nationwide to overcome current technology-related investigative challenges. Examples of such tools include, but are not limited to, effective interviewing tactics (to include polygraphs) to ascertain whether an offender has previously engaged in hands-on abuse; case deconfliction tools; high-priority suspect identification; covert operation tools; national reporting and information sharing capabilities among federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement (particularly ICAC task forces); evaluation of existing technical resources and tools; and peer-to-peer investigative tools.

Category 3: Investigative Tool and Technology Training – Develop and deliver new training and/or advanced skills training for the law enforcement community and prosecutorial agencies nationwide on tools, methods, and technologies that address child sexual abuse material, exploitation, and sex trafficking. Applicants can propose to develop and deliver new training curricula to deliver content through

multiple cost-effective delivery mechanisms.

Goals, Objectives, Deliverables, and Timeline

Goals

The goal of this program is to increase the technological investigative capacity and associated training of law enforcement, prosecutors, and other professionals nationwide to combat child sexual abuse material (CSAM) and online child sexual exploitation, including cases of child sex trafficking.

Objectives

OJJDP has developed the following program objectives.

Category 1

- Support the development of widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies that address CSAM and online child sexual exploitation, including cases of child sex trafficking.

Category 2

- Support the enhancement and/or refinement of widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies that address CSAM and online child sexual exploitation, including cases of child sex trafficking.

Category 3

- Increase the amount and availability of new skill-based training for the law enforcement community and prosecutorial agencies nationwide on widely used tools, methods, and technologies that address CSAM and online child sexual exploitation, including cases of child sex trafficking.

To achieve these objectives, it is expected that the successful applicant for any of the three categories will address the following in the "Project Design and Implementation" section of their program narrative:

- Outline and describe the proposed investigative tools, methods, or technologies and/or describe the proposed training for the law enforcement community and prosecutorial agencies nationwide on tools, methods, and technologies.
- Identify the gaps or planned improvements in existing investigative tools, methods, and technologies that the proposed product and/or training will address.
- Demonstrate that they have consulted with criminal justice agencies to gain a fuller understanding of any challenges and the operational context within which these tools would be employed.
- Indicate how the proposed product will target emerging technologies, target offender organizations, target high-value individual offenders, better identify victims, or enhance international collaboration.

Applicants, especially those who propose coalition-building and support, work with pilot sites, or work with project partners as part of their activities, must also clearly document support and engagement from their proposed and/or existing partners through letters of support and/or memoranda of understanding, where appropriate.

Deliverables

The following lists the required deliverables, such as expected products, services, or activities that should be developed/delivered as a result of this program:

- For all three categories:
 - Develop a timeline/work plan for the development, refinement, and advancement of the proposed investigative tools, methods, technologies, or training.

Develop a plan for how the proposed product or training will be marketed and made available to law

enforcement, prosecutors, and other professionals on a nationwide basis.

- Create a sustainability plan for the proposed product.
- Category 1: Development of widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies that address CSAM and child sexual exploitation.
- Category 2: Enhancement and/or refinement of widely used investigative tools, methods, and technologies that address CSAM and child sexual exploitation.
- Category 3: Development and delivery of new and/or advanced training for the law enforcement community and prosecutorial agencies nationwide on tools, methods, and technologies that address CSAM, exploitation, and sex trafficking. Applicants are expected to develop curricula, create an agenda, identify instructors/speakers, select training sites, provide logistical support, and execute each training event. Proposals may employ traditional classroom, hands-on laboratory-based, web-based, or other mechanisms for training delivery, depending on the objectives of the training program.

Funding under this initiative may support technology development and maintenance; the staff required to operate, update, and maintain the proposed platform or service; training and technical assistance on the purpose and use of the technology (including outreach and publicity activities); and staff engaged in coalition-building activities regarding the use of technology. Trainings must be provided at no charge to the participants; costs associated with travel and lodging for the trainers must be included in the budget.

The Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables are directly related to the performance measures that show the completed work's results, as discussed in the Application and Submission Information section.

For the purposes of this cooperative agreement, the successful applicant must clearly identify OJJDP as the federal funding agency that supported the development of all documents, tools, training, and materials created with grant funds.

DOJ, as the awarding agency, reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use and authorize others to use, for federal government purposes, the copyright of any work developed under an award or subaward and any rights of copyright to which a recipient or subrecipient purchases ownership with award support. Applicants should plan training events in conjunction with other relevant conferences and events, as appropriate, to maximize participation and cost effectiveness. When the project ends, the awardee will be required to transfer products to OJJDP.

OJJDP Training and Technical Assistance Awardee Standards

OJJDP has developed the Core Performance Standards for Training, Technical Assistance, and Evaluation to promote among providers the consistency and quality of OJJDP-sponsored training and technical assistance and to advance common expectations of performance excellence. The standards present minimum expectations that providers must meet for effective practice in the planning, coordination, delivery, and evaluation of training.

Requirements related to coordination of activities will include, but are not limited to:

- **Coordination with OJJDP NTTAC.** OJJDP requires all training and technical assistance projects to coordinate their activities with the OJJDP National Training and Technical Assistance Center (NTTAC) by complying with all OJJDP/NTTAC protocols to ensure coordinated delivery of services among providers and the effective use of OJJDP grant funding. To receive this additional priority consideration, applicants must describe how being a culturally specific organization (or funding the culturally specific subrecipient organization(s)) will enhance their ability to implement the proposed project (s) and should also specify which culturally specific populations are intended or expected to be served or to have their needs addressed under the proposed project(s).

Culturally specific organizations are defined for purposes of this solicitation as private nonprofit or tribal organizations whose primary purpose as a whole is to provide culturally specific services to, among others, Black people, Hispanics and Latino/a/e people, Native American and other Indigenous peoples of North America (including Alaska Natives, Eskimos, and Aleuts), Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and/or Pacific Islanders.

Proposal Abstract

A proposal abstract (no more than 400 words) summarizing the proposed project, including the purpose of the project, primary activities, expected outcomes, the service area, intended beneficiaries and subrecipients (if known), will be completed in the JustGrants web-based form. This abstract should be written in the third person and will be made publicly available on the OJP website if the project is awarded.

Proposal Narrative

The proposal narrative should be submitted as an attachment in JustGrants. The attached document should be double-spaced, using a standard 12-point font; have no less than 1-inch margins; and should not exceed 30 pages. Pages should be numbered and submitted as an attachment. If the proposal narrative fails to comply with these length restrictions, OJJDP may consider such noncompliance in peer review and in final award decision.

The following sections must be included as part of the proposal narrative:

a. Statement of the Problem

Applicants should briefly describe the scope of technology-facilitated crimes against children across the country; the need to investigate these crimes; and the need for support, training, and tools to increase law enforcement and prosecutorial capacity to investigate and prosecute Internet crimes against children. The applicant should use data to provide evidence that the problem exists, demonstrate the size and scope of the problem, and document the effects of the problem on the target population and the larger community. Applicants must demonstrate that they have consulted with criminal justice agencies to gain a fuller understanding of these challenges and the operational context within which these tools would be employed. Any data or research referenced in the narrative should include information about the source of the data and/or a citation. Applicants should describe any research or evaluation studies that relate to the problem and contribute to their understanding of its causes and potential solutions. While OJJDP expects applicants to review the research literature for relevant studies, they should also explore whether unpublished local sources of research or evaluation data are available.

b. Project Design and Implementation

Applicants should detail how the project will operate throughout the funding period and describe the strategies that they will use to achieve the goals and objectives identified in the previous section. Applicants should describe how they will complete the deliverables stated in the Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables section. OJJDP encourages applicants to select evidence-based practices for their programs. This section should also include details regarding any leveraged resources (cash or in-kind) from local sources to support the project and discuss plans for sustainability beyond the grant period.

If the applicant is seeking priority consideration for Priority 1(A), it should address in this section how the proposed project(s) will promote racial equity and/or the removal of barriers to access and opportunity, and/or contribute to greater access to services, for communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality.

Timeline. 4. Plan for Collecting the Data Required for This Solicitation's Performance Measures (10%) – evaluate the applicant's understanding of the performance data reporting requirements and the plan for collecting the required data.
5. Budget (5%) – evaluate for completeness, cost effectiveness, and allowability (e.g., reasonable, allocable, and necessary for project activities).

b. Other Review Criteria/Factors
