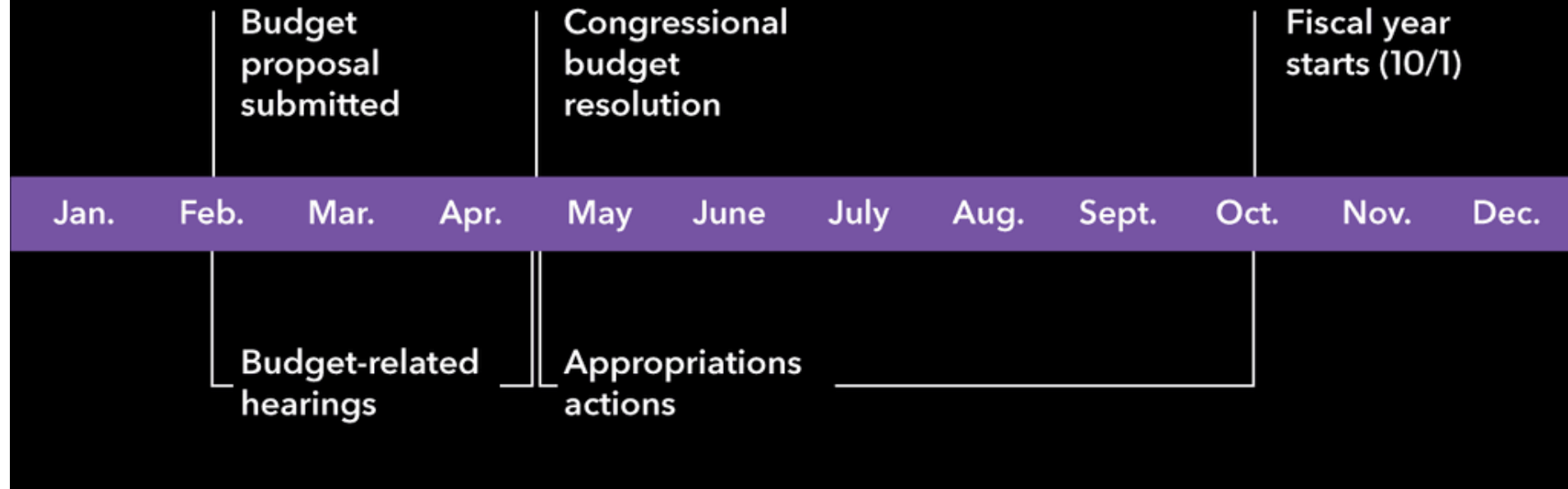

Federal Budget Process

- 1. President's Budget Request issued (first Monday in February – this year it was first Thursday in March).** Includes a detailed request for each department and agency.
- 2. Congressional Hearings (February – Spring).** Agency officials testify before authorizing and appropriating committees to justify budget requests, a preview of the major spending and policy debates.

3. **Budget Resolution (April 15).** Sets revenue and spending targets for legislation.
4. **Appropriations Bills (Sept. 30; fiscal year starts Oct. 1).**
Twelve bills funding federal agencies and programs. (Commerce, Justice, Science: CJS)
5. **Continuing Resolution (only if necessary).** Maintains funding based on the current rate to prevent a lapse in spending.

Congressional Committees

Appropriations Committees

- Write the legislation that *allocates* federal funds to the numerous government agencies, departments, and organizations on an annual basis.
- 12 subcommittees are tasked with drafting legislation to allocate funds to government agencies within their jurisdictions.

Budget Committees

- Monitor and enforce rules surrounding spending, revenue, and the federal budget.
- Principal responsibility is to develop a concurrent resolution to serve as the framework for the budget.
 - Resolution is an agreement between the House and Senate
 - Is not signed by the President and does not become law.

Authorizing Committees

- Develop and pass authorizing measures that can establish, continue, or modify an agency, program, or activity for a fixed or indefinite period.
- Set forth the duties and functions of an agency or program, its organizational structure, and the responsibilities of agency or program officials.
- Authorizations may be permanent and remain in effect until changed by the Congress, or they may cover only specific fiscal years.

Appropriations vs Budget Committees

Think of the federal budget as a pizza...



The Budget Committee decides how big the total pie is, as well as the size of each slice.

The Appropriations Committee (and more specifically each subcommittee) decides which toppings (programs) will go on their slice.

FY 2024 President's Budget

FY 2024 President's Budget

- Reflects the Administration's Priorities:
 - Advance public safety, reduce violent crime, and increase community trust.
 - Accelerate justice system reforms that promote community safety and well-being, racial equity and justice for all.
 - Transform the juvenile justice system into one that is effective and equitable, and that treats children as children and empowers youth to lead healthy, productive lives.
 - Ensure rights, access to services, and equity for all victims of crime.
 - Advance science and innovation to guide policy and practice.

OJJDP in the FY 2024 President's Budget

- Juvenile Justice Programs request is \$760 million. (Compared to \$400 million which is the FY 2023 enacted budget.)
- Several new programs, substantial increases to existing programs.
- New programs focus on reform, strengthening juvenile justice system and addressing inequity and hate crimes.

New Programs

- Community-Based Alternatives to Youth Incarceration Initiative (\$50 million)
- Eliminating Records-Related Barriers to Youth Success (\$15 million)

New Programs

- Youth-Focused Hate Crime Prevention and Intervention Initiative (\$5 million)
- Juvenile Justice and Child Welfare Collaboration Initiative* (\$30 million)
- Youth and Family Engagement Training and Technical Assistance* (\$6 million)

Substantial Increases to Current Programs

- Title II Part B Formula Grants \$157 M (+\$82 M)
- Improving Juvenile Indigent Defense Program \$40 M (+\$37.5 M)
- Missing and Exploited Children \$130 M (+\$25 M)

Delinquency Prevention Program (DPP): \$151 M (+86 M)

- DPP Carveout Programs also have proposed increases:
 - Children Exposed to Violence Awareness and Intervention Initiative \$30M (+\$20M)
 - Girls in the Juvenile Justice System \$20 M (+\$14.5 M)
 - Opioid-Affected Youth Initiative \$16 M (+\$3.5 M)
 - Tribal Youth Program \$30 M (+\$13 M)
- DPP General Funds/Minus Carveouts \$44.5 M (+\$32 M)

Other Increases

- Youth Mentoring \$120 M (+\$13 M)
- Victims of Child Abuse Act – Improving Investigation and Prosecution of Child Abuse Program \$50 M (+\$9 M)
- Child Abuse Training Programs for Judicial Personnel and Practitioners \$6 M (+\$1.5 M)

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Takeaways

- 2024 President's Budget reflects high priority for juvenile justice programming, with a focus on prevention, early intervention and reform.
- Unclear what new programs will get traction in the Congressional appropriation bills.

OJJDP Funding Resources

Types of Grants

Discretionary

- Awarded directly by DOJ to eligible recipients.
- Applicants apply directly to DOJ.
- Most often awarded on a competitive basis.
- Applications undergo a preliminary review process to ensure that they are complete and meet the eligibility requirements.

Formula

- Usually administered and managed by State Administering Agencies or other DOJ approved fiscal agents.
- Are most often awarded on a noncompetitive basis.
- Distribution of funds among eligible recipients is either statutorily defined, or defined by distribution process specified by DOJ.



Department of Justice Grants Program Plan

Fiscal Year 2023 DOJ Program Plan

The Department of Justice offers funding opportunities to support law enforcement and public safety activities in state, local, and tribal jurisdictions; to assist victims of crime; to provide training and technical assistance; to conduct research and collect national statistics; and to implement programs that improve the criminal, civil, and juvenile justice systems.

The DOJ Program Plan is a tool to help find potential funding opportunities (solicitations) from DOJ's grant-making Components, the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), and Office on Violence Against Women (OVW). The Program Plan provides summary details of the funding opportunities each DOJ grant-making Component is expecting to release or has released in a particular fiscal year.
