
Introduction to Performance Measurement and Performance Measures



Performance Measurement

What is Performance Measurement?

- The systematic and ongoing collection of data about program outputs and outcomes to measure a program's progress towards its stated goals.
- The ongoing monitoring and reporting of program progress and accomplishments, using pre-selected performance measures.






Performance Measures

What are Performance Measures?

- Performance measures are indicators, statistics, or metrics used to assess program performance.
 - **Input**: Resources (e.g., grant funding, human resources, employee time, etc.) used to conduct activities and provide services.
 - Output: A countable product or service that your program provides or produces. The volume of work your program accomplishes (e.g., number of youth served, number of trainings conducted, number of technical assistance requests completed, etc.).
 - Outcome: A change in knowledge, attitude, skill, and/or behavior that occurs within an individual, family, agency, system, or community.





Performance Measures

- Outcomes can be short term or long term:
 - **Short term**: The benefits and/or effects program participants experience while enrolled in the program or within *0–6 months* post completion/program exit.
 - **Long term**: The benefits and/or effects participants experience that occur within *6–12 months* following program completion/exit.






OJJDP Performance Measurement

OJJDP Performance Measurement Tool (PMT)

- The OJJDP PMT collects performance data from grantees and subgrantees and produces reports to be uploaded into the Grants Management System (GMS).
- Prior to each reporting deadline, grantees
 will be offered a training webinar on how to
 access and use the PMT.

Accessing the OJJDP PMT




Step 1: Log in

Users can log in to the PMT at https://ojjdppmt.ojp.gov.

The sections on the PMT Login page for each program tab include:

- PMT Reporting Schedule.
- PMT User Guide.
- Performance Measures Grid.
- Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ).
- Data Memos.

Step 1: Log in


 Provide your User Name and Password to enter the Performance Measure Platform (PMP).





Step 2: Grant Program Selection

- Select the program module and current reporting period and click Go.
- The current reporting period is from July 2017– December 2017.





Step 3: Federal Award Selection


- The Federal Award Selection page lists all active federal awards for the account.
- Click on View Federal Award to view the specific award for which you are reporting.





Step 4: Grantee Status Summary

- Click the RED button under Data Entry Status to begin data entry for your grantee or subgrantee report.
- Any subgrantees created for the federal award will also be displayed on the Grantee Status Summary page under the Subgrantee Performance subsection.





Tribal Youth Program and Tribal Healing to Wellness Courts Performance Measurement

OJDP OJJDP Core Measures

OJJDP has a set of Core Measures that are mandatory for most grantees*

- 1. Number of program youth served.
- 2. Number and percent of programs/initiatives employing evidence-based programs or practices.
- 3. Number and percent of youth with whom an evidence-based program or practice was used.
- 4. Number and percent of youth who offend during the reporting period (short and long term).
- 5. Number and percent of youth who are victimized (short and long term).



Additional mandatory and/or optional measures may be identified for certain programs. These measures are important to OJJDP, as they provide valuable information regarding the people the grant funds are serving, the services being provided, and the effectiveness of the services being provided.

^{*}These core measures may not apply to Training and Technical Assistance (TTA) or system improvement grantees, in which case they will report zeroes for each measure.

Tribal Juvenile Justice System (TYP III) Performance Indicators


- Number of people trained.
- Percent of program staff indicating increased knowledge of the program area.
- Percent of youth satisfied with the program.
- Percent of families satisfied with the program.
- Percent of staff satisfied with the program.
- OJJDP mandatory measures.
