



Apply for OJJDP Funding

The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) provides national leadership, coordination, and resources to prevent and respond to juvenile delinquency and victimization.

OJJDP's grant awards support state and community efforts to develop effective prevention and intervention programs and to improve the juvenile justice system so that it protects public safety, holds justice-involved youth appropriately accountable, and provides treatment and rehabilitative services tailored to the needs of youth and their families.

Before You Apply

Register early!

Follow these required steps to successfully apply for a grant.

- 1** Request a Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) Number
 - Process time: 1-2 business days.
- 2** Register or renew with the System for Award Management (SAM)
 - Time length: 7-10 business days.
- 3** Request an Authorized Organization Representative (AOR) and Grants.gov Username and Password
 - Time length: same day.
- 4** Acquire confirmation for the AOR from the E-Business Point of Contact
 - Time length: same day.

Grants & Funding

An Overview of the Process



1 Before You Apply

- Request a Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number, register with the System for Award Management (SAM), set up an Authorized Organization Representative (AOR), and Grants.gov username and password.



2 Develop Your Proposal

- Become familiar with OJP funding and resources such as OJP Grants 101 and the DOJ Grants Financial Guide.



3 Submit Your Application

- Competitive, discretionary grant applications are generally submitted through Grants.gov.



4 Application Review

- Application review may take more than 6 months from the application deadline.



5 Award Notification

- Successful applications are notified through GMS no later than September 30 of the calendar year.
