


Characteristics of delinquency cases handled in juvenile court in 2015

OJJDP's National Juvenile Court Data Archive documents workloads of the nation's juvenile courts


The number of delinquency cases peaked in 1997 and then fell 53% by 2015




More than one-third of delinquency cases in 2015 involved simple assault or larceny-theft offenses



Probation was the most common disposition for adjudicated delinquency cases




Males accounted for more than 70% of the delinquency caseload in 2015



Note: Other race includes American Indian/Alaskan Natives, Asian/ Pacific Islanders, and youth of unknown race.

Person offenses were consistently more likely than other offenses to involve detention
