



The following pages outline performance measures for the **Fiscal Year 2020 Opioid Affected Youth Program** and list the data that grantees must report on to complete a Performance Data Report. The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) requires grantees to provide data for the performance measure in the column labeled “Data Grantee Reports.” Grantees enter their data in the Performance Measures Tool (PMT), the OJJDP online system. The PMT automatically calculates simple statistics from the data entered, such as percentages and total amounts.

Grantees enter data in the PMT in January and July of each calendar year and are responsible for creating their Performance Data Report using the PMT. Grantees submit this report to OJJDP through the Grants Management System (GMS).

OJJDP groups performance measures for grantees performing similar grant-related activities, for example those who serve similar populations or who receive funding under the same program in the PMT, under a shared program area. Grantees for this solicitation report their data under the Discretionary 2.0 Grant programs, “system improvement and direct service intervention” subcategories.
