




Mission

Juvenile Justice Reform Act

 Passed in 2018 and amended the original Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act

New provisions related to Tribes



Title II Formula Funding

- Awarded to states to fund:
 - Effective state and local juvenile justice systems
 - Protect public safety, hold juvenile offenders accountable and equip youth to live crime free



Title II Requirements

- Ensure youth are protected by adhering to the four core requirements
 - Deinstitutionalization of status offenders
 - Separate juveniles from adult inmates
 - Remove juveniles from adult jails and lockups
 - Reduce racial and ethnic disparities



New Requirement - State Advisory Groups

 Representative from an Indian tribe or an individual with experience in tribal law enforcement

Minnesota and Idaho State Advisory Groups



Expansion of Title II Pass-Through Funding

- States with Tribes are required to pass through a specific amount of their Title II grant award.
- Many states pass through much more than the required amount.
 - South Dakota has used some of these funds for a probation officer dedicated to tribal youth.

 - FY 19- 9 awards, \$3,146,905


